Hidden Treasures of Snow

A student-led chapel in January? What topic could we explore that would reveal another wonder of God? I was busy thinking, pondering, and contemplating when I remembered the book of Job!

"Have you entered into the treasures of the snow?" Job 38:22a

That was all it took to spawn ideas. Snow!! Some students were ready to dive into making snowflakes. Their eyes went wide when they realized they had signed up for making BIG three-dimensional snowflakes, to reflect the learning of the next group: the fact finders! Pages of notes, diagrams, illustrations, and flow charts had to be distilled into meaningful chunks so the youngest children could understand how snowflakes were made.

A third group of children eagerly tackled composing verses about snow using familiar nursery rhyme tunes. Rhyming is important; but so is the number of syllables, and the songs had to stay on topic. The girls' creativity sparkled and dazzled, like snowflakes, when they added delightful choreography.

Chapel is not complete unless God's Word is opened to reveal His wonderful works to us. Some students boldly offered to read Scripture passages in front of a full audience.







What was a WOW moment to us, as teachers in Grade Four and Five, was observing how the children naturally gravitated to the groups that showcased their skill set. It was a joy to see students recognizing their God-given gifts and using those gifts in areas that were a natural fit for them.

Students developed core competencies as they prepared an all-school Chapel assembly. They had to collaborate together to transform individual ideas into a cohesive presentation. Creativity was stretched when students had to problem-solve the design for their super-size snowflake and take a risk to explore designing beyond their current level of expertise.

Presenting another Wonder of God chapel in front of a live audience highlighted our levels of personal awareness. Core competencies include self-advocacy, self-regulating, and well-being. During the preparation, students sought help when needed and took ownership of their choices. They definitely experienced that learning takes patience and time! But what I'm most proud of is the students persevered through the tangle and messiness of preparing a Chapel assembly that clearly helped the whole school recognize another wonder of God and appreciate the treasures of snow.
